#### Notes from NW Forum Meeting 09.00 3/3/2019

#### Shanty Town, Greymouth

Approx 80 members present.

President - Gave an overview of change in financial position over past 5 years, ie Income down 25%

Expenditure up 44%

Current deficit \$5k pa

Ergo - position not sustainable in the long term.

Suggestion to increase Membership fees to \$60pa received from the floor, with consensus that this was acceptable. Committee were given a mandate to formally review fees and make a proposed at next AGM (Nov2019) for implementation in October 2020.

Action: Committee

Frank Cleary - Commented that the Committee is Auckland centric and has been for some time – committee would welcome nominations from members elsewhere in the country.

Ian H – Proposed a Committee/Group Leader meeting at each National Weekend, starting 2020.

Floor – Calendar requested for 2020 year (2019 not run as insufficient photos received for 2018 year!) send photos to Stephen Higgs (Editor).

I've booked our Solway accommodation for 2020. My challenge now .... to hold the car together for another 11 months!


#### 'Drive Your Triumph' Day

### "Tech" bits and pieces

#### Saving the Planet

I know putting 'Saving the planet' and 'driving a TR' in one sentence creates a bit of a conflict, but we can all do our wee bit.

When those of us with spin-on oil filters do an oil and filter change, the natural thing to do is toss the old filter straight in the bin. However, we can help the environment in a small way by drilling or punching a small hole in the top of the filter housing and allowing it to drain (a couple of

days is ideal) before disposing of it.

I got 260 mls out of my TR6 filter, a Ryco Z87A equivalent.

Once drained the spent filter can legitimately be put in the scrap metal bin at the recycling centre as 90% of what's left is high-grade steel.

Even an original canister filter will yield a fair

drop if left to drain before going into the landfill.

Those who take their cars, old or modern, to a garage or dealer for servicing should be asking if they have do this. Don't just assume that because they're professionals that they have adopted best practice.
