It struck a chord, and I commiserate. The pressure on Group Leaders to get out and about and lead the charge is great. For I, too, have fallen short this last quarter as mechanical "issues" relegated me to the sideline.

My tale of woe continues. At the time of last writing I'd laid up the TR3A. I'd only driven 300 or 400 kms since a major head rebuild and rocker gear overhaul, but started experiencing odd symptoms. I suspected either a failed head gasket or, perish the thought, a cracked head.

Subsequent examination showed the head gasket failed between cylinders 2 and 3. Keen to find the cause, liner projection heights were measured. They were not the culprit, thankfully all projections being within allowable tolerances. We concluded the gasket to be of inferior quality. And so, drawing on Ken Pfeffer's contacts, (thanks Ken) I managed to acquire a nice new Payen type copper gasket. But just as the head was to be re-fitted, it was discovered that a couple of cylinder head studs had stretched, and threads on some others looked a tad dodgy. More delays, and a rushed order to Moss Motors.....' ten new head studs, ten nuts, and ten washers please '.

Each day I tread a well beaten path to the letterbox. There's nothing from Moss. I remain anxious. I remain disappointed. "The package must arrive any time now", I mutter, my faith in the postal service ebbing away.

Presidents Report to 2019 Annual General Meeting

7.00pm Tuesday 12th November 2019 Horse & Trap, Mt Eden

Welcome to the 34th Annual General Meeting of the TR Register New Zealand Incorporated

Thank you all for joining us here this evening.

As my 3rd year in the role of President draws to a close. I once again extend my thanks to the current committee, the supporters out-side of committee, and the Group Leaders for the time and effort they have put in over the past 12 months. Their support has been tireless.

It is with some sadness that we advise you of the resignation of Trevor Hynds as Treasurer. Trevor is stepping down from both Treasurer and the Committee after some 25 years in the role. Trevor has provided wise counsel to the Committee and a steadying hand on the purse strings. Our sincerest thanks go out to Trevor for all his sterling work in keeping the Register's finances in order for such a long time. Thank you Trevor.

Financial Position

As shown in the Financial Report, while the financial position is not dire, it is not as good as it perhaps could be. (This is in no way a reflection of our out-going Treasurer.)

Earlier this year the committee initiated a review of income and expenditure trends over the previous 5-7 years. It was apparent that income was declining, costs were steadily increasing and such trends are unsustainable. Actions have now been put in place to review and address the areas of concern. Namely:- Membership, National Weekend, Printing and Spares.

In summary.
☐ Membership – fees have remained unchanged for some 20+ years at \$40pa. Following NW 2019 forum discussion, the committee received a mandate to review fees; a proposal to increase them to \$65pa, from 2020, will be tabled tonight.
□ National Weekend costs have escalated; the expectation going forward is that NW will return to being largely self-funding. To assist NW organisers achieve this goal, a set of guidelines is under development and a NW coordinator role has been created.
□ Our Magazine is world class and it a tribute to the editorial team who produce it. We have, however, undertaken a print cost review to ensure we are getting the best possible value. Options have been received from alternate printers and these will be worked through in the coming months. The "hard" vs "soft" copy debate will also be re-visited.
□ Spares' revenues and costs have also been reviewed. Options on how to improve margins, whilst maintaining fair costs to members are under discussion.
Our Budgeting process and regular review of same will be one of the key initial t

tasks to be undertaken by the incoming Treasurer.

Membership

Our members remain our core asset without whom the Register would cease to

exist. It has been encouraging to see a steady flow of new members over the past year and we particularly welcome new Members from the BoP Triumph Owners Club who merged with us this year. I extend a warm welcome to all new members and hope to meet you at some stage.

In the Regions

The Group Leaders play an amazing role in maintaining member enthusiasm in their respective regions. It is a tribute to the GLs that they change so infrequently, and I offer specific thanks to the few that have stepped down this year and welcome those that have stepped up. You know who you are.

The Website carries the Events Calendar for each group to post planned activities and I encourage GLs to post their events & Members to look at this regularly and attend events in other regions when possible.

Web Site

I think you will agree our new website it is a great asset and reflects the Register well, however, it is still a work in progress, As anticipated there have been some suggestions for additional features and functionality, and while not every request can be met, there will be additional services added in the future.

Spare Parts

Revenue from Spare Parts and Member Indent service contributes greatly to the Register income, however the cost of storage and insurance are a substantial off-set to that income. The whole Spares' operation is part of the over-all Income/Expenditure review.

National Weekend 2019

The National Weekend in Greymouth and the subsequent tour thru the South Island was deemed a resounding success. It was attended by a greater number of NZ members than in previous years and the largest recorded number of international attendees - from Australia and UK.

Committee member Stephanie Booth has taken on a new role of NW Coordinator to help the organisers of future NW's with direction and financial guidance.

International Relations

Our international relationships continue to flourish especially within Australia and UK and the US to a lesser extent. Well she's coming along fine the car is a complete rolling chassis, Engine, Gearbox, Diff all reconditioned, all bushes replaced and steering, brakes refurbished, body is about 3/4 finished after almost every panel had to be repaired or replaced, but I can see the light at the end of the tunnel, a very, very long tunnel, but nevertheless she should be back on the road within the year, what year I hear you ask!!! ????

"Tech" bits and pieces

6 point v/s 12 point Ring spanners

If you have a rusted in, or rounded off bolt try using a 6 point ring spanner instead of a 12 point spanner. The 6 point ring spanner seats against the flats of the bolt or nut while the 12 point sits against the tips and is inclined to round them off.

Gearbox covers on A type O/drives

When you have the opportunity, it is a wise move to cut a hole in the right side of the cover so as the valve setting lever is accessible. On the solenoid side cut a much larger hole so as the Solenoid is accessible and can be removed. Both of these holes can be covered with a metal panel sealed and PK'd in place (cut out above the base section of the cover).

If you ever have trouble with your O/drive, checks and adjustments can be done from above. Much easier than floundering around underneath. Another hole filled with a rubber bung is also worthwhile above the valve plug. This can be used to check the operating pressure if your O/drive isn't working too well. All these openings can save time and having to remove the Gearbox cover for adjustments and checks at some future time.

Solder or Crimping

When you need to replace a connector or renew a wiring joint there is now a choice of solder or crimping. Our TR's from original have soldered joints and if you wish to retain originality soldering is the way to go. The draw back with soldering is that if the wire is under vibration or fatigue the wire can fracture due to work hardening at the point where the solder ends on the wire strands.

The most successful way to help eliminate a break is to use a couple of sleeves of heat shrink over the joint to protect it. If you are not into originality crimped connections don't suffer from the same problem although it is still best to use heat shrink on your connections for that added protection

Tightening up the base plate and changing the rotor and distributor cap solved the problem, but not before it had provided opportunity for plenty of discussion and speculation!

Everyone else made it to the café without incident, just before a fairly heavy shower of rain. After an enjoyable lunch, however, the rain went away, and the TRs were assembled for a group photo on the adjoining reserve before we all headed off home.

After this adventure, activities in October and November have been limited to our usual pub evenings. The October event, at a venue that will not be named, was notable mainly for the fact that several members very nearly died of starvation between ordering dinner and it arriving at the table. 


