Now back home we start the process taking care of those car issues that have cropped up, in our case a squeaky front suspension. And some rust bubbles that have accumulated over time.


Autumn is here but the sun is still shining so may get in another run or two before the bad weather starts.

The Slice recipe everyone wants from the Judges morning tea we put on at the Brit & Euro Show.

Chewy Oat Fruit Ginger Slice

150 gms self-raising flour
110 gms rolled oats
I tablespoon ground ginger
175 gms brown sugar
200 gms dried fruit -chopped roughly - I
used Tasti fruit mix (baking aisle)
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
200 gms butter , melted and cooled
5 chunks crystallised ginger thinly sliced



Grease a 28cm x 18cm slice tin - line with baking paper

Preheat the oven to 180 degrees Celsius

Put the flour, oats and ginger in a food processor and process until the oats are chopped but still have texture.

Tip into a bowl, add the brown sugar and the fruit

Mix so that fruit is coated in flour and is separated.

Add the vanilla to the melted butter and tip into the bowl and mix well.

Tip into the baking tin and press flat .

Scatter the crystallised ginger over and press into the slice.

Bake for 25 minutes until golden.


Leave the slice in the tin to cool before cutting into squares

TaRga Time

Top of the South member Jon Haack takes on a project to rejuvenate a well known TR3 with a history of track and road competition



Since the production of TR's began back in the early 1950's they have been a popular choice amongst those with a bent towards motor racing. Across the decades many TR's have featured in road and track events and there are still those today with a passion for historic and classic race cars who keep the Marque alive and in front of the public gaze.

One such person is Marlborough based Jon Haack who has recently acquired a well campaigned TR3 that he is now breathing fresh life into with a view to competing in Targa events, VCC classic racing events as well being able to attend local outings. Targa cars are required to be road legal which means you can do a picnic run one day and thrash it on a track the next – perfect for someone with a hankering for some competitive sport (much like our editor!).

Jon's car was originally imported from the USA in 1995 as a standard car and was then built up into a race car and raced a few times before being sold in 1998 to Rod and Anne Corbett. They set the car up for, and successfully competed in, Targa Rallies, track and street races and hill climb events building quite a race history which Jon is still researching.



Rod still campaigns a nicely prepared, red TR3A which many will be familiar with. Jon's words "Rod had undertaken the largest amount of the restoration before telling me I needed to buy it from him, finish the rebuild and come Classic racing. Well. what could I do? I've been told on many occasions that it's about

time that I grew up and being a racing car driver was something I was going to do when I got to that day."

"Basically the car came as the photo shows with a beautiful paint job, new alloy head and sump (goodie ones of course!) a few boxes of parts and two people waving good-bye to their baby with tears in their eyes. Now all that is needed is to clean up the box of parts, figure out what some of them are and put her back together again — how hard can that be??



Luckily for me I have a good mate who has more expertise than you can shake a stick at! He's the expert and I'm the gofer — an arrangement I'm entirely comfortable with! Being a retired builder I am fortunate to have a good-sized shed that is ideal for working on projects however my tools are mainly of the woodworking kind — ideal if I'd bought an older wood-framed car perhaps! Fortunately my mate has all the necessary tools to get the job completed."



Exactly when the car will be completed is yet to be confirmed. "By Christmas," says Jon, "but which Christmas has yet to be decided!"

At the time of writing the engine work had just been completed and fired up for the first time and was running sweetly. Whatever the final completion day turns out to be we will be looking forward to seeing another TR on the road in the Top of the South and also campaigning on the classic race circuit and Targa rallies around other parts of the country.

For more than 20 years Kevin Tinkler has kept track of the New Zealand TRs including undertaking the necessary required research and has now stepped down from the role. Whilst we have the records it's the knowledge Kevin has acquired over the years that will be difficult to replicate. A hard act to follow indeed but thankfully Kevin is still available to impart his wisdom when needed. Thank you Kevin for not only all the years of service but also the well documented records passed on to me. Here we go;

March 2025

TR6 – 1970, Rego CP006, Commission No CP52370, Australia new, Imported from Sydney in 2011 Acquired by new member Bruce Lawrence.

TR6 - First registered in New Orleans, March 1974. ex Uk & Australia. Commission No CF20162U, Red, wires , OD, RHD conversion, imported in 2024 by new member Michael Fann of Auckland. Compliance processing is underway so hopefully we should see it on the road in the not too distant future.

TR8 – 1980 DHC, RHD conversion, Rego CBD197, Ex Bob Grubb, Glenorchy, now with member Glen Rosser, Waikato.

There have been a number of TRs listed on Trademe in the past months and current listings include;

TR2 – 1953, long door, red, Rego GGD327, Engine No 3926E, OD, asking \$55,400, Christchurch.

This NZ new TR2 has had two owners from new before my 3 year ownership. I have had it on show in my small collection but I'm reluctantly selling it as I have two TR2's and this is the best driving one and I need it to make way for another vehicle. The car has new paint, wires, hood and side screens and upholstery. Just had a new WOF and 12 month reg.

TR2 – 1954, long door, red, Rego ITR2I, TS3276, asking \$35,000, Wanganui.

My beloved 1954 Triumph TR2 is reluctantly for sale. Too many other projects and I've handed in my rallying licence. It's an early "long door" model. Imported into NZ from Australia in early 1960's. I bought her in 1979. Body off restoration during 1980's. Modified for Targa racing from the late 1990s. Fully road legal. Mods include: Engine upped to 2,200cc with forged pistons, rally cam, oil cooler, remote oil filter, original SU carbs replaced with Dell'Orto's. Gearbox replaced with Triumph 2500PI O/D box with specially made switch gear. Vanguard diff. Wire wheels. Uprated suspension front and rear including front and rear anti-roll bars (Revington TR kits from the UK). Rack and pinion steering. Front disc brakes. Electrics converted to alternator. All the required safety equipment for Targa rallying including roll hoop, race seats, harnesses etc. Comes with a few spares including original seats, two doors and a boot lid and a few mechanical items. Odometer is in miles and reads 25,071. She's certainly not in "concours" condition as she's been rallied but she drives well and handles better than most other "sidescreen" TRs.

TR3A – 1960, white, Rego 60TR3, asking \$50,000, Rangiora.

A Christchurch new 1960 TR3A - fully restored circa 1995 and done very little since. Comes with tonneau cover. Also has side doors and soft top but never used by me. Originally owned by the Triumph distributor in Christchurch - apparently did some hill climb competition work back in the day. In 1967 sold to a Canterbury University student. He tells me he drove the car home to Auckland on university holidays - often hitting the magic 100mph on the Desert Road 5000 rpm with no overdrive, unlike his earlier TR2s - Fully restored by Dave Mehrtens, Dunedin, circa 1995. Moto-Lita steering wheel. Brooklyn Aeroshields fitted - can be removed. Also comes with a near new set of Pirelli P6000 on Performance mag wheels and a roll bar (not fitted) and numerous spares, handbooks and workshop manuals. Has been converted to -ve earth and electronic ignition fitted.

TR6 – 1973, blue, black hood & trim, Commission No CP00169 ?, Asking \$65,000. Waimac, Rangiora

This car is in excellent condition throughout. Manual / Overdrive - 150HP. Straight clean body and beautiful paintwork. Interior very nice and tidy. Like New soft top and tonneau. No hard top. Good tires / factory wheels. Fuel Injection. Solid and beautiful to drive — goes like a TR6 should. Complete with Jack and handbook. Lots of service records and receipts.

TR4A – 1966, white, California plate TJE284, Canterbury, Auction – Not known to the Register, would someone provide the Commission number for the Register record.

This car was imported from California in 1996. It appears to be rust free and straight, very original. It has been in dry storage ever since! Lots of new parts. One dent in front roll pan. All matching numbers. New set of personalised number plates to match original plate with the car. Engine parts: New sleeves and pistons, new narrow belt conversion, new oil filter conversion. Freeflows, new Cam and crankshaft sprocket plus new duplex time chain, Unused Kelford F16 cam, new rocker shaft, 2 o'hauled starter motors and other new parts (gaskets etc) Fuel pump o'hauled. New water pump. Has overdrive gearbox plus a spare overdrive. Brand new wire wheels plus all new hardware plus original wheels and hardware. All 14 tyres have never been on the road. Front suspension overhauled, new bushes, one new trunnion and upright, new uprated suspension brackets. Brake booster overhauled. Had rack checked and there is a spare rack. Overhauled callipers. There is a new sway bar and new mounting hardware. There are new ball joints and tie rod ends. Has surrey top (hard) also soft convertible top that needs new vinyl plus a Tonneau cover. Excellent mint chrome, grill, boot rack, bumpers etc. Has 3 spare crown wheel/pinions, spare axles, rear stock Armstrong shock overhauled but also has 2(!) sets of telescopic shock adapters and telescopic shocks of various hardness. There are boxes and boxes of parts, UJs, new tail light lenses, master cylinders, bonnet badge .etc. Upholstery very average, Dash peeling coating but redeemable, I have a NZTA cover approval letter that the vehicle can be accepted for compliance.

TR6 – 1970, blue, black hood & trim, Rego GBTR6, Commission No CP52143-O, Asking \$67,000, Nelson

1970 Triumph TR6 fuel injection, 4 speed manual with type A overdrive on 2/3/4 gears. 93,000 miles not KM, Rimmer suspension and Koni Shocks Imported from the UK and complied in 2010. Extensive work carried out during this time; I have photos of the work. In my ownership I have completed a significant refurbishment/upgrade of the vehicle. following is some of the work carried out, all receipts available. I have received a number of inquiries recently from ex owners looking to track down their old car or to provide information on a particular TR that they might be interested in purchasing. Interestingly, the records were not up to date for each of those vehicles given that they had been sold at some stage and the Registrar not advised. So please when you do sell your TR let the Registrar know the details of the new owner. They may not choose to join the club but we know where the vehicle has gone at least. The same applies if you acquire another TR. If you spot a TR, record the Rego, year and location if possible. Commission numbers are very helpful also.
